Video Session Two: Remember Together

Introduction

Our kids love stories -- especially family stories! Is there a way to make our retellings of them more interesting? At POP, we think so. Try a story box! Today's example will help you make one of your own.

Question

Take a look at the example here. Is there a story from their own history that your children request often? Do you have objects or pictures related to this story that it would be easy to gather together in a box or basket?

Invitation

If you choose, take time over the next few days to put aside story-related objects as you come across them. If your children ask for the story and you have a few extra moments, pull out your story box and talk about the special memories connected to the objects you've collected!

Sample: Story Basket Brainstorm


My child often wants me to tell the story of the day they joined our family
