Senior Minister

Rev. Dr. Marlin Lavanhar

A Quarter-Century With All Souls:

This April marked 25 years since I first stepped into the pulpit at All Souls. It was Easter morning, I was 31 years old, and I was bursting with enthusiasm. None of us could have imagined what lay ahead: the attacks on the Twin Towers and the Pentagon in 2001, the nationwide recognition of marriage equality, the election of our first African American president, Bishop Carlton Pearson and his family joining our church and ministry, a global pandemic that claimed millions of lives, or the emergence of an All Souls community that now includes members from across the country and around the world. So much has happened—and I cannot imagine a better community with which to experience it all.



Ministerial Transitions & Gratitude:

This past year has brought its own significant changes. Rev. Randy Lewis accepted the offer to be our Assistant Minister on an ongoing contract. We also brought on Rev. Dr. Nicole Kirk as our part-time Program Minister for a two-year term. As the church year draws to a close, we prepare to say goodbye to two beloved leaders: Rick Fortner, who retires in June after 26 years as our Music Director, and Rev. Gerald Davis, who concludes 16 years of service as our Affiliate Minister. We are deeply grateful to both for their many years of dedicated ministry.

Capital Campaign Preparation:

A major focus of my work this year has been laying the foundation for our upcoming \$14 million Capital Campaign. As we've assessed the feasibility of this transformative effort, we've already secured approximately \$6.5 million in pledges and gifts. We plan to publicly launch the campaign in January 2026. I encourage each of you to begin considering a historic gift to support this exciting project. Pledges may be fulfilled over a period of 3–5 years.

Service Beyond the Pulpit:

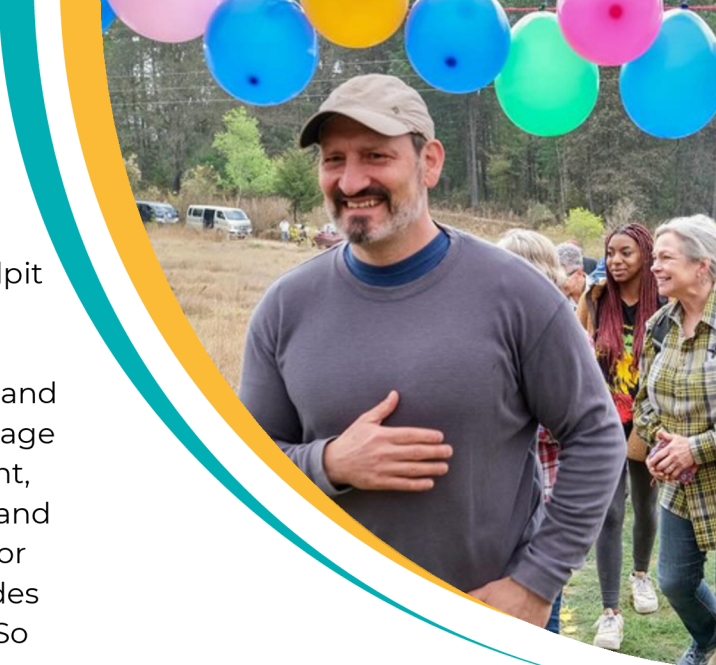
In March, I joined the Sienna Project with my wife and daughter to help build a school in Guatemala, working alongside fellow church members. In May, All Souls hosted a major Interfaith Vigil in support of Oklahoma's immigrant communities.

Civic Engagement:

Beyond All Souls, I continue to serve on the board of the Greenwood Cultural Center (now as a member rather than president), as Vice President of the Knippa Lecture Board, and as a board member of the Oklahoma Center for the Humanities at the University of Tulsa. I remain active with the Downtown Ministers and with Enfrente Unidos—a coalition of leaders addressing immigration issues in Tulsa.

A Thriving Congregation:

Our congregation continues to grow, and our services, programs, and events are thriving. We regularly host gatherings and initiatives that oppose Christian Nationalism and promote democracy. In this critical moment when our nation faces deep divisions and the erosion of democratic norms, All Souls remains a bold, engaged voice for justice, pluralism, and the common good. I continue to feel enthusiastic and am honored to serve as your minister.



President's Report

The Power of Belonging:

One of my favorite opportunities as President of the Board of Trustees is attending the new member dinners. We typically hold these events twice a year, and they provide an opportunity to get to know our newest members and hear some of their stories. I find it so moving to listen to what attracted them to All Souls and what we, as a church community, offer them—the important role we play in their lives and within their families. The stories of belonging, of being able to be their authentic selves, of acceptance and in some cases, of redemption are meaningful and beautiful.

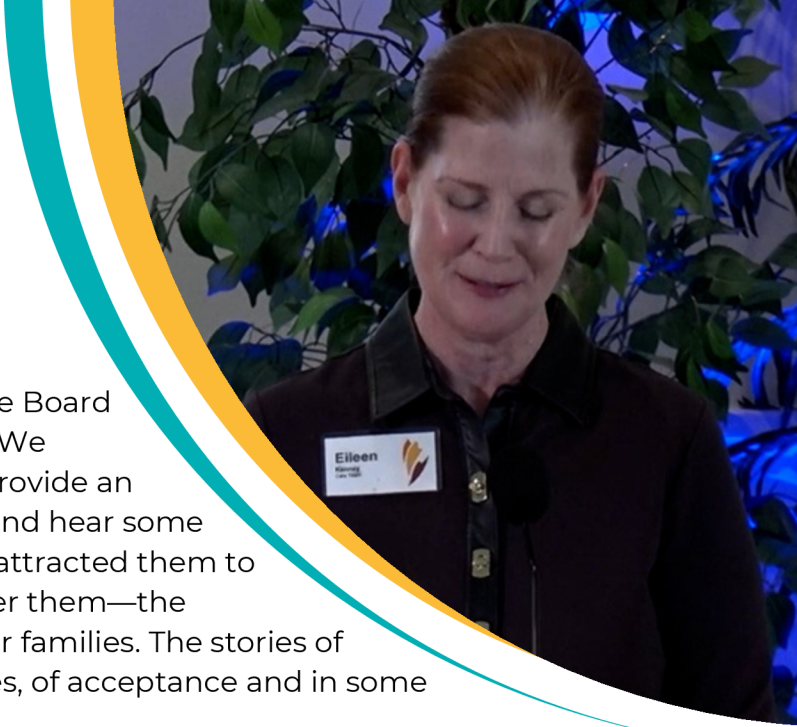
I think it's easy for those of us who have been members for some time to begin to take for granted the unique role All Souls plays in our lives and in our community. To us, our pledge to Love Beyond Belief is the norm, but each time I hear from new members, with their fresh eyes and fresh perspective, it reinvigorates me and helps me renew my vow to not take All Souls for granted.

Board Leadership in Action:

This year, I had two goals for our Board of Trustees—to increase our engagement with the congregation and to deepen our financial literacy as it pertains to church finances.

The congregation was exceptionally gracious when, on a sunny January morning, the trustees stepped outside our comfort zones and led all aspects of both church services with a message centered on the month's theme of Grace. We shared personal stories, sang, and prayed with you. I had members coming up to me for weeks afterward, thanking the Board and expressing how they felt they knew the trustees better—and that was our goal. We are here to represent you and to serve you. You are the church.

The Board of Trustees takes seriously our role as stewards of the church, and we continue to ensure we are knowledgeable about the church's finances. This includes All Souls' robust endowment overseen by our Investment Committee. We carefully track our income and expenses each month, and we were pleased to end 2024 with a balanced budget. A portion of our yearly income is from the Love & Light Gala, and this year we celebrated our beloved Rick Fortner and exceeded our fundraising goal! This is all due to the fabulous gala committee's work and everyone, inside and outside All Souls, who attended the gala, had a great time while raising money for our Justice Council.

President's Report

Ministries That Make a Difference:

I hope you will take time to read each of the reports within our annual report. These reports really underscore the important role of All Souls within our community—our justice groups, our choirs, our pastoral care teams, and our lifespan religious education groups all support our congregation, but they also play leadership roles within the broader Tulsa area and beyond. You cannot spend any time in our building or in our gorgeous gardens without appreciating the dedicated work of our building and grounds teams. And now thanks to a generous donation, our steeple is a shining beacon at night, perhaps helping a few new souls find their way to our doors.

Growth and the People Who Make It Possible:

With all of these outreach and support activities it's no wonder our membership continues to grow. Since July, we have added 121 new members, and our congregation is now 1,840 strong with members from 39 states and 8 countries. I am thrilled that parking is again becoming a challenge, and our Zoom rooms are full. On Christmas Eve, I don't think we could have squeezed one more body into our pews as we celebrated. The same can be said for Heritage Sunday, Easter and other special services. This growth does not simply happen by chance. It takes inspirational ministers and innovative, smart staff to create the programs and ministry that make people want to be part of our church. At All Souls we are fortunate to have among the best in both categories.

An Invitation to Engage:

As dynamic as our ministers and staff are, the heart of the church is you, our congregation. You bring your talents, your time and yes, your treasure to All Souls, and we need each of you to be engaged and supporting the church. Consider getting involved in any of our councils, committees or small groups. I can assure you, you will benefit from the experience, and we will benefit from your involvement. We need you.

Membership

At All Souls, membership means belonging—to each other, to a legacy of love, and to a future we're creating together. This year, our Membership Team helped more people than ever say “yes” to that belonging. Whether arriving in person or logging in from afar, new members shared powerful stories of finding home at All Souls.

Many joined in the wake of the 2024 election, seeking a spiritual home that affirms every identity and background. Some relocated to Tulsa just to be near this community. Others joined online from across 39 states and 8 countries, becoming part of the ever-growing All Souls Everywhere members.

To support this growth, we updated to the Realm database, allowing members more access to their records, giving history, and more. Joining Classes were redesigned to highlight volunteer pathways, and first-time guests were welcomed through new Wednesday night dinners.

Each Sunday, our Welcoming Souls volunteers created a culture of radical hospitality—online and in person—ensuring every visitor felt seen, valued, and at home.

Membership Office

All Souls is home to (1,658) local members in Tulsa and (182) All Souls Everywhere members who join us from around the world. Together, all (1,840) members contribute to the life of the church through financial support and the sharing of their gifts and talents. The Membership Office maintains accurate records and thoughtful procedures to ensure that both members and visitors feel genuinely welcomed into the All Souls community.



Welcoming Souls

Welcoming Souls is the first impression of All Souls. This team ensures guests, newcomers, and members feel seen and valued. They coordinate ushers, greeters, Welcome Table hosts, chat hosts for online services, and personal guest follow-up—offering hospitality in-person and online.



Worship & Music

Every week, our sanctuary fills with music, meaning, and connection. Some come looking for hope. Others for rest, community, or a sense of purpose. At All Souls, worship isn't about having the same beliefs—it's about showing up with your whole self, wherever you are on your journey.

This year, that spirit showed up in countless ways. On Sunday mornings and special services alike, we gathered to honor life's big moments, explore meaningful themes, and hold space for grief and joy alike. Whether it was Flower Communion, Coming of Age, or Christmas Eve, our services brought people together—in person and online—for something real and rooted.

At All Souls, we believe the moral arc of the universe bends toward justice—because we bend it. Our worship life reflects that promise, week after week.

Looking Ahead:

In the year ahead, we're focused on making worship more connected, accessible, and meaningful for everyone. That means improving our hybrid services, investing in better tech, and working more closely with Religious Exploration and Communications to share unified messages.

Worship & Music

This year, we celebrated Rick Fortner's retirement after 25 years of extraordinary musical leadership. Rick didn't just direct music—he helped shape the soul of All Souls. His vision brought beauty, joy, and deep connection to our worship and community life. At the Love & Light Gala, we honored his legacy with music, memories, and heartfelt gratitude.

As Rick's final year unfolded, our music program thrived. The Adult Choirs shared their gifts across Tulsa—singing at the Pride Parade, the John Hope Franklin Dinner, our holiday concert, and more. They brought cheer to the Tulsa jail and Day Center and welcomed over 200 guests to a workshop with renowned choral director Nick Page.

Our Cherub, Children's, and Youth Choirs (CCYC) continued to rebuild post-pandemic, returning to 90% of their regular schedule. This year saw the joyful return of Choir Camp, a successful Trivia Night fundraiser, and vibrant participation in holiday services and Youth Sunday. With a new chapter on the horizon, music at All Souls remains a powerful source of connection, expression, and community.

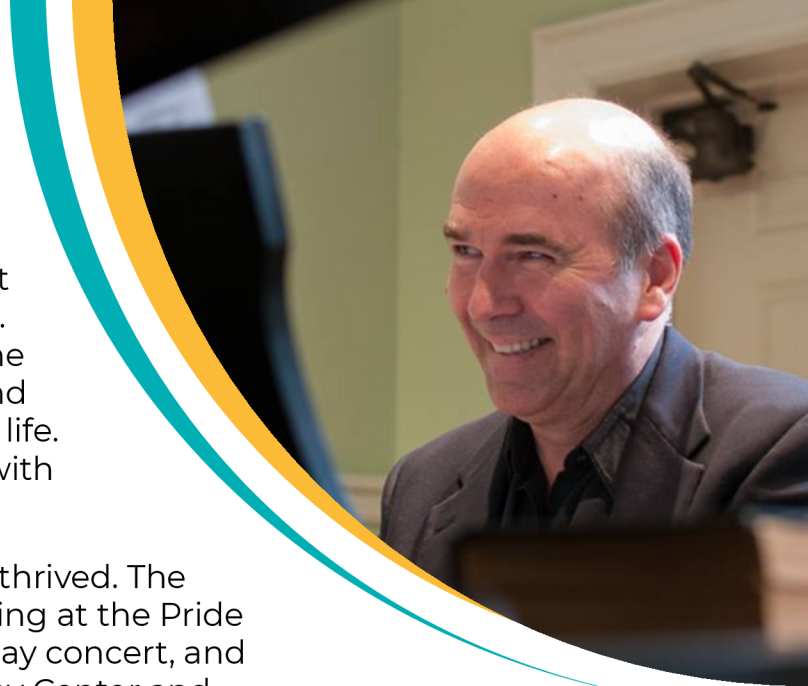
Looking Ahead:

Music Groups & Choirs



Adult Music Program (AMP)

The AMP Board supports the adult music ministry by guiding its vision, supporting the Music Director, and strengthening community within and beyond the choir. The board helps coordinate performances and deepen the role of music in church life.



Adult Choir

From sacred to popular jazz, our music is as diverse as our singers and their ranges. All Souls Adult Choir is open to everyone.



Chamber Choir

Chamber Choir's repertoire is eclectic, including gospel, jazz, and pop, and occasional classical and sacred music. The Chamber Choir often performs with professional instrumental and vocal musicians from the greater Tulsa area.



Cherub, Children's, and Youth Choirs

As an extension of our Children's Religious Exploration program, Cherub, Children's & Youth choir offers a high-quality music education and opportunities for children to learn about their own talents, interests, and forms of self-expression. CCYC fosters personal growth and the development of life skills through travel, study, teamwork, and excellence in performance.

Assistant Minister

Rev. Randy Lewis

Introduction:

Three years into my return to All Souls, this past year has been both humbling and invigorating, a time of integration that has balanced continuity with innovation, and tradition with transformation. I've deepened my spiritual practices, refined my leadership voice, and embraced new dimensions of ministry that reflect both the evolving needs of our congregation and my own unfolding call.

This year challenged me to listen more deeply, serve more fully, and trust the quiet work of presence. Whether sitting with families in grief, shaping multigenerational worship, or building new systems of care, I've witnessed how this community continues to open itself to change while holding fast to love. I carry this work forward with gratitude, grounded in the belief that ministry is not just what we offer but rather it's what we co-create.

Worship & Rites of Passage:

I supported worship planning and leadership across Sunday services, Wednesday Connections, festival days, and life rites. I preached regularly, approximately once per month, and made intentional strides in sermon preparation by incorporating feedback from Rev. Dr. Lavanhar and other ministerial colleagues. Collaborating with worship associates and musicians, I helped design services that are spiritually resonant, culturally inclusive, and emotionally grounded.

Life rites remain a sacred and vital part of my ministry. This year, I officiated five weddings, offered pre-marital counseling to two couples, led 22 memorial and funeral services, and created several healing rituals tailored to personal and pastoral needs.



Pastoral Care & Community Support:

Our Pastoral Care Ministry remains a strong and responsive network of compassion. I continue to coordinate more than a dozen initiatives, including:

- Care Team & 24-hour Pastoral Care Line
- Friendly Souls – Delivered 42 holiday poinsettias and sustained regular outreach to homebound members.
- Helping Souls – We are currently exploring a new healthy meal planning and delivery initiative. Stay tuned.
- Other pastoral care ministries include the Memorial Garden Team, Memorial Guild, Shawl Ministry, SpiritSong, NAMI, Parish Nurses, Grief & Loss Groups, Cancer Support, and Diabetes Support Groups.

This ministry is strengthened by a remarkable team of pastoral care chaplains and ministers: Rev. Cathey Edwards, Rev. John Biedler, Rev. Doug Inhofe, and Rev. Ren Pasco, who will begin serving part-time as our Online Community Minister. Our work together, grounded in presence, compassion, and commitment, has enabled us to extend care to individuals and families through hospital visits, spiritual companionship, follow-up calls, and specialized support.

It has also been a joy to work closely with my fellow ministers, staff, and volunteers to ensure that pastoral care at All Souls reflects our shared values of dignity, accessibility, and deep listening. Whether responding to urgent needs or reimagining long-term care systems, our collaboration is a meaningful expression of ministry in community.

Assistant Minister

New this year:

- Alzheimer's Support Circle – Created a dedicated space for caregivers and individuals with early-stage diagnoses, offering both education and empathy.

We will also be updating our All Souls Rideshare & Shuttle Program, which successfully brought numerous members to church throughout the year thanks to volunteer drivers. The program will pause for the summer and resume in September.

Justice & Community Engagement:

This year marked my transition out of the staff liaison role for All Souls' Justice Teams with the arrival of Rev. Dr. Nicole Kirk, our new Program Minister. Dr. Kirk brings a deep commitment to the spiritual grounding of justice work, as well as a wealth of experience in theological education, public engagement, and congregational life. Her presence has been a tremendous asset to our team and a source of renewed energy and clarity across our justice ministries. She has already begun strengthening partnerships, amplifying lay leadership, and weaving justice more intentionally into our worship, programming, and outreach. Though no longer the primary liaison, I continue to support justice efforts by:

- Serving with Rev. Dr. Lavanhar on the Mayor's Police Community Coalition, focusing on criminal justice reform and community trust
- Participating in public witness opportunities that reflect moral clarity and care
- And efforts on the Jensen Resettlement House

Although immigration setbacks prevented the arrival of the refugee family we had prepared for, I was proud to help lead the completion of the Jensen Resettlement House, supported by volunteers, donors, and staff from our building, grounds, and remodeling teams. The home now stands fully stocked and ready to receive a future family with dignity and love.

Spiritual Development & Teaching:

My personal spiritual practice grounded in daily prayer, meditation, music, and journaling continues to anchor and shape my ministry.

This year, I further developed and taught several spiritual development programs, including:

- Healing Your Religious Wounds – A course for those recovering from harmful or limiting religious experiences
- IMPACT for BIPOC individuals – A curriculum exploring racial identity, belonging, and liberation within Unitarian Universalism

And I also participated in other intercultural programs such as D.I.V.E. and Conscious Inclusion. I am looking forward to great things in the coming church year. Both programs are rooted in the Double Helix Model developed by Rev. Lavanhar; a framework that integrates spiritual growth with intercultural engagement, underscoring their mutual necessity for transformation.

Conclusion:

Ministry is both a calling and a commitment. I remain deeply grateful to serve alongside colleagues, volunteers, and members who believe in the transformative power of love, justice, and community. Together, we have not only sustained cherished traditions—we have planted seeds of bold and life-giving possibility.

I look forward to what's unfolding at All Souls and remain hopeful about the future we are building together.



Pastoral Care

At All Souls, pastoral care is how we carry one another—through joy, grief, and everything in between. This year, our teams offered comfort with quiet presence and steady compassion.

The Care Team kept our 24/7 line open for those in crisis, while Friendly Souls reached out to homebound members with cards, calls, and poinsettias.

SpiritSong shared music at the bedside of those nearing life's end, and Parish Nurses supported over 100 people with advocacy, wellness checks, and new AEDs.

Helping Souls stepped in with meals and rides during recovery, and the Life Decisions team helped members navigate end-of-life choices with clarity and care.

The Garden Team restored the Campbell Fountain, planted hundreds of flowers, and enhanced our sacred grounds—creating a space of peace and beauty for all who gather and remember.

Our pastoral care teams remain committed to walking beside every member in need—with dignity, presence, and the quiet power of love in action.

Pastoral Care



Care Team

The Care Team is All Souls' pastoral lifeline, reaching out to members experiencing illness, grief, or other life transitions. The team makes phone calls, sends cards, offers support on birthdays and anniversaries, and helps those who reach out by phone.



Friendly Souls

Friendly Souls offers companionship and care to All Souls members who are homebound, in senior living communities, or feeling isolated. Through cards, calls, and personal visits, this ministry shares love and connection across the miles.



Garden Team

The Garden Team beautifies and sustains the Memorial Garden and campus grounds through seasonal plantings, tree care, composting, and ongoing landscape improvements. Their volunteer work and fundraising bring life and love to every corner of our green spaces.



Helping Souls

Helping Souls supports All Souls members in short-term times of need, offering help with transportation, meal delivery, errands, and pet care during illness or recovery.



Life Decisions

This team helps members prepare for end-of-life care and decisions, offering guidance on medical, legal, and spiritual matters. They facilitate sessions on advance directives, wills, memorial forms, and cremation planning.

Pastoral Care



Life Events

The Life Events Coordinator organizes weddings, memorials, child dedications, and interments. Working with ministers, staff, and volunteers, this role ensures each ceremony is meaningful and accessible for our diverse congregation.



Memorial Guild

The Memorial Guild ensures that families and guests attending memorial services at All Souls are greeted with care, hospitality, and support. Guild members work alongside ministers and staff to create a welcoming and respectful atmosphere for those grieving.



Parish Nurses

Parish Nurses offer spiritual and health-related support to congregants, helping them navigate medical and emotional challenges through counseling, advocacy, and education—while coordinating care with other pastoral teams.



SpiritSong

SpiritSong is a group of volunteer singers who provide bedside singing for those in the final days of life. With reverence and care, they sing at homes, hospitals, Clare House, Porta Caeli, and at church events, offering peace, comfort, and spiritual presence through music.

Support Groups

Support at All Souls is more than a kind word—it's a lifeline.

This year, All Souls Trekkers gathered each week to walk alongside cancer survivors and caregivers, while Healing & Holding Grief created a sacred space where those in mourning could breathe, speak, and be held.

We launched an Alzheimer's Circle for early-stage care, offered strength and solidarity through our National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) and Diabetes groups, and quietly showed up with meals, rides, and poinsettias through Helping and Friendly Souls.

In every meeting, message, and moment of care, these groups reminded us: healing happens in community.

Looking Ahead:

We hope to grow these groups, raise visibility, and ensure no one at All Souls faces hard times alone.

Support Groups



All Souls Trekkers - Living Beyond Cancer

All Souls Trekkers is a weekly Zoom-based support and education group open to cancer survivors, caregivers, family members, and healthcare professionals. It offers a safe space to discuss the physical, emotional, and spiritual challenges of living with cancer, while providing access to community resources, mutual support, and advocacy.



Diabetes Support Group

This online group supports people living with diabetes and those who care for them. By exchanging knowledge and strategies, members improve their understanding and personal care practices around diabetes.



Healing & Holding Grief

This support group focuses on aiding individuals in processing feelings of grief and loss. It offers a compassionate environment where members can share their experiences and receive support from others who are undergoing similar challenges.



NAMI Family Support Group

Hosted by All Souls, the National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) Family Support Group offers a confidential, supportive space for those with loved ones experiencing serious mental illness. This peer-led group provides encouragement, education, and community.

Program Minister

Rev. Dr. Nicole Kirk

Introduction:

On the first day of September 2024, I joined the All Souls Ministry Team as the part-time Program Minister. With more than twenty years of ministry experience, I quickly immersed myself in All Souls' program and worship rhythms. The congregation, ministry team, and staff warmly welcomed me, and they are a pleasure to work with—what an extraordinary team. In my role as Program Minister, I collaborated with our justice council and active justice teams to expand our church-wide justice offerings. I provided support and coverage for the ministry team in areas ranging from pastoral care, preaching, and Wednesday Chapels to representing All Souls at public events. "Momentum" has been my watchword for this year at All Souls – to regain momentum for our justice teams and bolster areas of church life that call for new energy, creativity, and support. All Souls is a vibrant community, and my joy on Sunday mornings reflects the energy I receive from the congregation each week and from working with my colleagues Marlin Lavanhar, Randy Lewis, Gerald Davis—and the whole team.



Year in Review:

I leapt into my role at All Souls by preaching at both Sunday services on my first day and started getting to know the members and staff. I collaborated closely with Shirley Vincent, our fantastic chair of the Justice Council, and Quanah Scoggins, our wonderful programs assistant. Together, we launched a new program (Justice Jams) to unite our justice teams, provide congregation-wide opportunities to learn more about justice initiatives, and serve as a way to invite new people to join our justice teams. We also assisted the justice teams in creating a budget and improving the post-gala grant process. Here are a few more highlights: In January, I supported our Green Team as they organized a Climate Justice Sunday (January 26th). Throughout the year, I provided support to our justice teams, whether it was visiting Sheila's Circle at the Tulsa Farmer's Market, serving dinner with Partners in Education (PIE) team members at Unity Learning Academy, or supporting our LGBTQ+ and Allies team's documentary film event while meeting with community leaders to discuss their programs. I also attended both Women's Retreats and led a worship service with the women of All Souls. I revitalized announcements during worship and have appreciated the strong commitment at All Souls to creating quality worship. Randy and I worked with our coming-of-age class to help shape their credos. Whenever possible, I strive to lighten the heavy load of the ministerial team.

Looking Ahead:

Here are a few of the areas I plan on focusing on in the coming year:

- Working closely with our Youth Director, Corey Smith, and this year's youth advisors to update the Coming of Age program.
- Providing adult education courses during Wednesday Connections in the coming year and as needed.
- Continuing to work with the Justice Teams to add new members to the teams, robustly support current initiatives, and develop new outreach. Leadership development and support is an ongoing need.
- Work with interested members to restart our Reproductive Justice Team and reengage with programs for the incarcerated.
- Meeting with each of the Justice Team leaders this summer for long-range planning.
- Provide resources that enable our Justice Teams to access the information they need to lead. This includes working to develop guides for the budgeting process and updating the grant process.
- Recruit new members for our Justice Teams.
- Further develop the Justice Jams and discern other ways to communicate opportunities for members to participate.
- Cover events, services, vacations, and other needs for the ministry team and additional projects specified by the senior minister and the ministry team.
- At the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly, I will lead the Sunday, June 22 worship service, and I am a part of a short history film that will be presented in General Assembly Session 3.

A Note of Gratitude:

In late December, my husband, Frédéric, died after a 13-month battle with pancreatic cancer. I received tremendous love and care from the members of All Souls and the marvelous ministry and staff teams. I experienced firsthand the power of All Souls' pastoral care. Marlin Lavanhar, Kacy Selby, Rick Fortner, and the whole team created a beautiful memorial service to celebrate Frédéric's too-short life.

Conclusion:

I look forward to another year with All Souls, and I find the mix of the part-time with my full-time position not only manageable but invigorating. My full-time position is at Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago as an associate professor and the Schulman Chair of Unitarian Universalist History (we teach mostly online). My role at All Souls complements my teaching the next generation of Unitarian Universalist ministers. I look back on this year with a full heart. All Souls is growing not only in membership but in community, spirit, and living our values of love and justice out into the world.



Advocacy & Justice

At All Souls, justice means putting love into action—locally, nationally, and globally. This year, our Justice Teams led with courage and compassion. They rallied 105 members for a Mayoral Accountability Session, launched the churchwide Justice Jam series, and brought over 60 people together for our first-ever Climate Justice Revival.

From our school partners in Tulsa to highland villages in Guatemala, they delivered what matters most: food, education, shelter, and hope. They built All Souls' 13th school abroad, renovated a transitional home for refugees, and provided winter gear and field trips for hundreds of local students.

Whether empowering LGBTQ+ voices, supporting women entrepreneurs, or making sure every vote counts, these teams remind us that justice isn't a program—it's a way of being together in the world.

As we continue this work, our Justice Teams are focused on growing their leadership, strengthening partnerships, and creating new ways for more people to get involved.



Advocacy & Justice



All Souls ACTION

ACTION (Allied Communities of Tulsa Inspiring Our Neighborhoods) is a nonpartisan, interfaith coalition building community power for justice. All Souls' ACTION team trains leaders, hosts listening sessions, and builds partnerships across differences to influence local policy.



All Souls Community Resource Bank (CRB)

CRB addresses hunger and poverty in Tulsa through the collection and redistribution of food and material goods. By building relationships and partnerships, CRB works to meet immediate needs while fostering a deeper awareness of systemic issues among the All Souls community.



All Souls Justice Council

The Justice Council brings together leaders from each of All Souls' justice teams. Together, they coordinate collective action, increase visibility, and support each other's missions in pursuit of a more just and equitable world. The Council's work is grounded in the church's mission and our collective values of advocacy, awareness, environmental justice, and human dignity.



All Souls LGBTQ+ and Allies

All Souls LGBTQ+ and Allies Justice Team champions advocacy and visibility for 2SLGBTQIA+ communities through engagement and education. We aim to strengthen connections within All Souls Unitarian Church and the broader LGBTQ+ community, promoting an inclusive environment where all can thrive.



Green Team

The Green Team promotes environmental stewardship and climate justice through education, action, and advocacy. The team supports All Souls' sustainability efforts and builds partnerships locally and nationally.

Advocacy & Justice



Partners In Education (PIE)

PIE uplifts Tulsa Public Schools' students by partnering directly with two high-need schools: Unity Learning Academy and Monroe Demonstration School. Volunteers support teachers, sponsor student experiences, and respond to basic needs—providing clothing, meals, and encouragement throughout the year.



Refugee Resettlement

Formerly the Refugee Relief Team, All Souls Refugee Resettlement focuses on welcoming new refugee families and supporting their transition to independence. Through partnerships, housing initiatives, and hands-on care, the team facilitates resettlement and self-sufficiency.



Sheila's Circle

Sheila's Circle supports Guatemalan women through a partnership with Friendship Bridge, honoring the legacy of Sheila Swearingen. By selling handmade goods and raising funds, the team uplifts women's health, education, and entrepreneurship abroad.



Sienna Project

The Sienna Project is a living memorial to Sienna Lavanhar, building schools in rural Guatemala to increase access to education. Founded by Sienna's grandfather, the project is now carried forward by All Souls, with members and friends fundraising, traveling, and physically helping to construct classrooms in remote villages. Each school changes lives for generations.



Voting Is Power (ViP)

ViP empowers voters in Tulsa and beyond by promoting nonpartisan voter education, registration, and mobilization. The team focuses on removing barriers to voting, building coalitions, and uplifting civic engagement within All Souls and the broader community.

Religious Exploration

At All Souls, spiritual growth lives in questions, connections, and quiet moments of meaning. Over the past year, our programs brought that spirit to life across every generation—welcoming newcomers, deepening understanding, and creating space for courageous conversations.

Children explored big ideas through story, song, and Sunday classes. Teens found belonging in spiritual practice and public action—studying scripture through a Unitarian lens, raising \$4,000 at a garage sale, and showing up for justice at Pride and the MLK Parade. Adults filled our Wednesday classes and completed five Conscious Inclusion cohorts, building trust and awareness through deep dialogue.

It's a powerful reminder that spiritual growth thrives wherever people feel seen, heard, and invited to grow together.

Looking Ahead:

Religious Exploration will continue expanding family programming, deepening racial justice education, and creating spaces where people of all ages can grow in spirit, purpose, and belonging.



Youth

The focus for Youth Programming centered on integrating new families and new ideas into our processes. Middle School and High School attendance increased this year, and we introduced several new ways to engage our youth spiritually and emotionally. We used Fellowship as a template as we looked for opportunities in programming to further develop and nurture so many new faces.

With Building a Better World, our facilitators assisted our Middle Schoolers this year with an imaginary world that they created using the principles and values of Unitarian Universalism. This curriculum is loosely based on the Dungeons and Dragons roleplay games with necessary alterations made for our purposes. This program has been very well received, and we plan to continue through the summer.

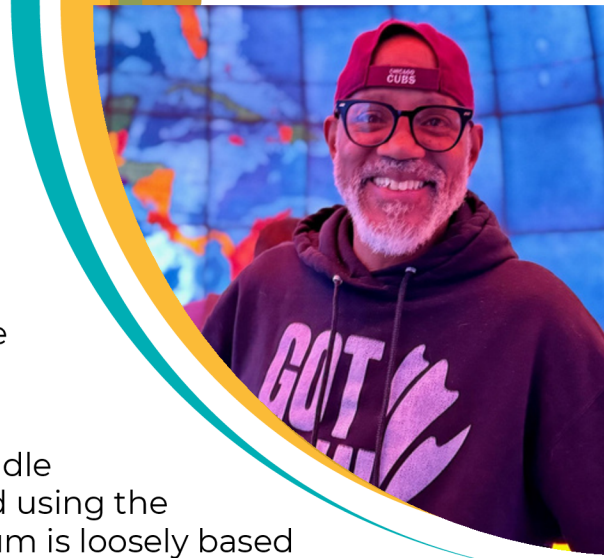
Likewise, for our High School Youth we introduced a monthly Bible discussion entitled 'Exodus to Resurrection' based on an actual book written for Youth discussions written by Seminarian Dr. Gary Peluso-Verdend. It was important to introduce some biblical literacy for our Youth, to counter the biblical fundamentalism espoused by so many in our nation and state. These monthly discussions led to meaningful discussions about religion, the Bible, and relating it to current events.

Coming of Age saw a sizable increase with 18 participants this year! The Vision QUUest Campout provided the necessary environment to bring these new faces together for this yearlong spiritual journey. Along the way, we also made our annual pilgrimage to Boston. This year we got to see rare UU artifacts and Divinity Hall at Harvard. Walden Pond, Arlington Street Church, King's Chapel, and the Freedom Trail were also pivotal stops for their Credo development. However, while in Boston we introduced an intensive Credo Workshop to further assist with some very memorable Credos on Coming-of-Age Sunday.

Our Youth also found ways to serve our beloved congregation in a number of ways this year. We hosted the intergenerational Halloween Festival on the West Playground to the delight of our younger participants. We also assisted with serving dinner for Wednesday Connections dinners when needed. Our motto is Service begins when the Service ends.

The Youth Department hosted a very successful Garage Sale this year raising just over \$4,000.00. Finally, we always look forward to participating in the annual PRIDE and MLK Parades. The Youth we have are amazing young people that strive to make the Sponge Room a loving, all-inclusive space where everyone is loved, especially our newcomers!

Overall, I am very proud of what we have been able to accomplish this year. We found new and creative ways to exhibit our UU values, to touch lives in a positive manner, and to continue to be a beacon for love and goodness. Moving forward, we look forward to welcoming new families to join us in Loving Beyond Belief! Thank you for your continued love, support, and participation in the Youth Program.



Our Program of Adult Religious Exploration seeks to honor the religious upbringing of every person while allowing the evolution of a mature and current faith that nurtures the individual's spirituality as part of a family and a community. We celebrate the gift of life and that every person has gifts to share. We make meaning of our experiences, we are stronger together, and we are practicing imperfection. We continually strive to become more self-aware of our own identity so that we may understand and take responsibility for our impact on others. We believe that death is as natural as birth and work to live and die with dignity.



All Souls Reads is a bi-monthly hybrid book group exploring stories of resilience and justice through fiction and nonfiction. All are welcome—pre-reading is encouraged but not required—and sessions offer space for meaningful reflection and community.



The Book Table curates and sells thought-provoking literature weekly at All Souls. It offers titles from All Souls Reads and beyond, promoting spiritual exploration and community engagement through books.



All Souls provides childcare for infants through pre-K during Sunday services, Wednesday Community Connections, and other events. Children engage in creative, social, and safe activities that help them feel at home in the church community.



CRE teaches children they are inherently good, loved, and capable of making a difference. The program offers spiritual guidance, values-based learning, and interactive experiences grounded in UU principles.

Religious Exploration



Coming Of Age

Coming of Age is a year-long epic adventure for ninth graders (plus) that gives our youth the time and space to look inward and determine what it is that they believe about the big questions in life.



Conscious Inclusion

Conscious Inclusion is a transformative nine-month program exploring racial identity, cultural understanding, and allyship. Cohorts begin in racial caucuses before joining together for shared learning and healing, guided by *The Racial Healing Handbook*.



D.I.V.E. (Diversity, Inclusion, Vulnerability, Engagement)

D.I.V.E. fosters empathetic action, beloved community, and intercultural understanding through shared reflection and intentional vulnerability. This team facilitates deep dialogue to explore intersectionality and challenge structural inequities.



Middle School

Middle School Youth explore questions of ethics, morality, and social justice using role playing games and various forms of creative expression with their gifted and engaging facilitators. Using discussion questions and activities, we explore the topics of race, ecology, morality, class, abilities, goals, gender, identity, diversity, and inclusion.



Youth

The Youth Department at All Souls seeks to develop spiritual, intellectual, and emotional character in a safe, all-inclusive space for Middle and High School Youth. Students of all races, genders, and sexual orientations meet weekly to discuss monthly themes, world religions, social justice, and UU history. Our mission is to create an environment where everyone is loved, everyone is heard, and everyone gets to participate. We encourage free inquiry, mutual respect, and responsible behavior.

Community

At All Souls, community means showing up—for each other, for joy, and for connection across every stage of life. This year, our Affinity Groups brought people together in meaningful and memorable ways.

Day Alliance served more than 1,300 guests through monthly luncheons and memorial receptions, offering nourishment for both body and spirit. The Women of All Souls connected to over 500+, and hosted retreats that focused on centered healing, justice, and spiritual growth.

Young at Heart kept friendship and playfulness alive with monthly lunches and games, while the Men of All Souls created space for thoughtful conversation and new bonds through events and online conversations.

Together, these groups remind us that belonging doesn't just happen—it's built, one gathering at a time.

Community By The Numbers:

Community Groups



Day Alliance

Day Alliance brings people together through monthly luncheons featuring guest speakers and meaningful conversation. The group also provides hospitality support for memorial receptions and donates to support church needs.



Men of All Souls

The Men of All Souls seeks members from all walks of life. We are a multicultural group for people that seek the company of all races, genders and sexual orientations. We strive to cultivate social opportunities that provide community and fellowship among the congregation. This group encourages passion, kindness, and compassion while looking to help those in need.



Women of All Souls (WAS)

WAS is a vibrant community open to all who identify as women or gender non-conforming. Through events, workshops, retreats, and sacred circles, they foster connection, creativity, learning, and advocacy—with a special emphasis on women's issues, wellness, and justice.



Young At Heart

Young at Heart is a social group for older members and friends of All Souls who meet monthly for lunch and games. Gatherings occur on the first Thursday of each month and include a catered meal followed by games such as Rummikub, Scrabble, and Bridge, with a suggested donation.

Introduction:

Operations is the backbone of any organization. At All Souls that encompasses the Front Desk, Finance, Stewardship, Membership, Communication, IT, AV, and Building and Grounds. These are the folks that make every event happen, who ensure your pledges are recorded, who touch base with visitors and get new members plugged in. They greet everyone with a smile and answer questions on a daily basis. They make sure you have water for your meetings, and sort the recycling from the trash. In a busy community like All Souls, these folks are the essential workers. We simply could not do all we do here without the outstanding team that we have. I want to tell you a little bit about them and celebrate their excellence.

Moving To Realm:

In 2024, the biggest project handled by this department was easily the database migration and transition to Realm. Many of you now use the new Realm program, and associated Realm Connect app, to stay in touch with the church, learn about events, and communicate with your committee and teams. Progress and change are hard at times so we're not quite "there" yet, but the folks working behind the scenes to make this shift as smooth as possible deserve our thanks. John Boston (IT), Phil Brubaker (Stewardship and Membership Manager) and Nefertiti Sanders (Membership Associate) did the heavy lifting on this project, and I cannot thank them enough for their continued work and collaboration.

A Website Update:

Another massive project was the website reboot. Membership & Hospitality:

Speaking of the future, we are building the next generation of All Souls members with the help of Nefertiti Sanders. IT Support:

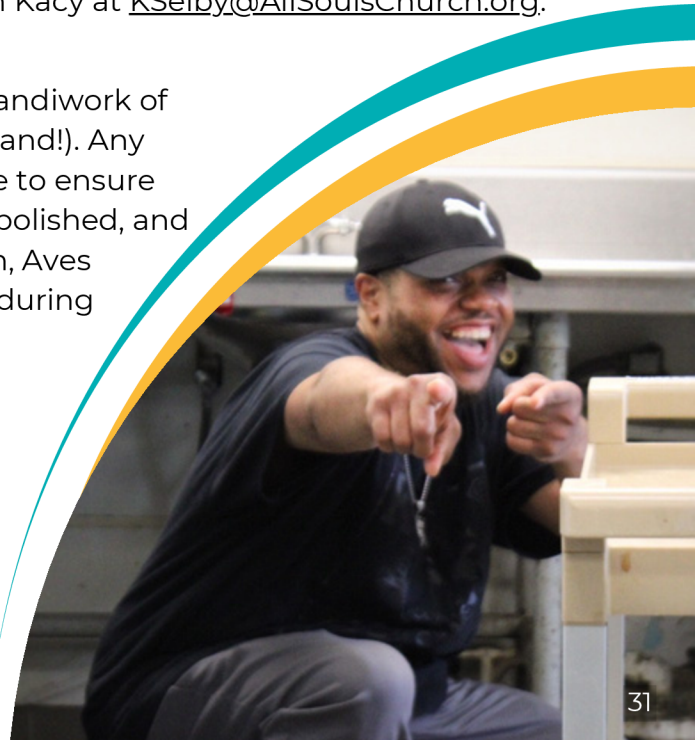

Policies & Procedures:

Personally, 2024 has been a year of processes and procedures. As an organization grows, it's important to ensure the processes and procedures grow with it. It can be a tricky balance and it's easy for organizations to become bogged down with too much paperwork and bureaucracy. During the pandemic, things necessarily had to change and, as congregational life continues to return to "normal", many aspects of congregational life have had to adapt. This year we have revised the Employee Handbook, and written or updated policies about a variety of subjects from group fundraising to the process followed when a member passes away. We have improved our insurance coverage to reflect the true worth of the building and its contents, and better cover us with regards to cyber-attacks. We have worked as a team to create a better process for staff, members, and the public to book events at All Souls, and continue to refine that process.



Jensen House:

In addition to the behind-the-scenes administration of the church, I have worked closely with Rev. Randy, Building and Grounds Supervisor, Jerry Burleson, and the Conservage and Refugee Resettlement teams, and Thursday Work Group to prepare the "Jensen House" (the small blue house immediately west of the parking lot on 30th) for a refugee family that was preparing to arrive this spring/summer. Sadly, the national pause on most refugee programs meant that the family we intended to house would not be able to come. But we look forward to working with local entities to support refugee and asylum-seeking families already in the country instead.

Green Oven:

In late 2024, your generosity through our Giving Tuesday campaign provided enough funding to purchase a new, more environmentally friendly oven. This project brought together our weekly cooks John Boston, Paula Vella, and Joe Nurre, Gary Alison of the Green Team, and staff member Jerry Burleson to establish the most practical and affordable move toward green energy. The ovens were finally installed after nearly six months of effort, including new wiring and ventilation, and we have already benefited from their increased capacity, quick cook times, and better environmental stewardship.

Accessibility & Safety:

As a staff liaison, I work with several volunteer groups at All Souls. The Accessibility Committee's efforts to make All Souls a more accessible place for everyone have resulted in things like the implementation of our ASL interpreters, large print bulletins and braille hymnals. The Health, Safety & Security Team work towards improving the safety and well-being of everyone while on campus through Sunday security, first aid kits around the campus, and emergency plans for tornado season.

Staff Culture:

Aside from my oversight of administration, HR, and the campus, I generally manage the staff. Working at All Souls is a delight in large part because of this wonderful staff. They are hardworking, receptive to feedback, eager to help, and always willing to step into the gaps. They support each other through the difficulties of life and celebrate the wins. I cannot stand the phrase "blessed," as overused as it is in the bible belt buckle, but I honestly do feel that we are blessed. To have such an incredible team who make a "job" into a "community" feels nothing short of miraculous to me and I hope you feel it, too.

Community Engagement:

In the community I am a founding member of the Tallasi Creek Council Oak Tree Foundation and sit on the board of directors. In 2024 we successfully lobbied the city to return Creek Council Oak Tree Park and the adjacent Stickball Park to the Muscogee Creek Nation and continue to work alongside the tribe for the protection, preservation, and promotion of the Creek Council Oak Tree – the birthplace of Tulsa.



Operations

At All Souls, operations is the quiet engine behind everything we do. This year, we switched to Realm, a new database and app to help all our members stay connected, and unveiled a redesigned website to welcome newcomers with ease.

Our AV and Communications teams expanded our reach with 156 livestreams, closed captions, ASL interpretation, and nearly 69,000 YouTube views. Behind the scenes, we upgraded tech, coordinated HVAC repairs, installed new steeple lighting, and oversaw the installation of eco-friendly double ovens.

Accessibility improvements included Braille hymnals, sensory kits, and newly modified pews for mobility devices. Our Building and Grounds and Thursday Work Group volunteers helped renovate the Jensen Refugee House and supported safety upgrades, including lighting plans and first aid stations throughout the building.

Our operations teams are focused on sustainability, security, and systems that serve a growing, evolving church. Their work ensures All Souls remains not just organized—but open, welcoming, and ready for what's next.

Our work ensures that people feel informed, included, and inspired to be part of this community.

The All Souls Health, Safety and Security Team cares for the health and safety of our congregation, its members and staff through education, training, and the crafting of policies and procedures.



Information Technology (I.T.)

The I.T. Department supports all technology infrastructure at All Souls, ensuring digital systems, security, and communications run smoothly for staff and members alike.



Thursday Work Group

The Thursday Work Group is a behind-the-scenes powerhouse at All Souls. They meet weekly to take care of minor repairs, painting, and ongoing upkeep of our church buildings, ensuring the facility remains safe, functional, and beautiful for all.

This year, careful planning, generous giving, and wise investment helped us end 2024 with a small surplus, exceed our pledge goal, and strengthen our foundation for growth.

From the diligence of our Audit Committee to the oversight of our Investment Committee, every dollar was thoughtfully tracked, managed, and directed with purpose.

We launched new reporting processes, increased endowment support, and prepared for long-term expansion initiatives.

Stewardship

Generosity fuels everything we do at All Souls—from Sunday services to social justice. This year, that spirit showed up in powerful ways.

We surpassed our \$1.45 million pledge goal, replaced our failing kitchen ovens with \$25,000 through donations and a Giving Tuesday campaign, and quietly launched a campaign to reimagine our campus for the future.

The Love & Light Gala became our most successful yet, raising over \$120,000 while honoring Rick Fortner's 25 years of musical leadership. And our first-ever Pickleball Tournament served up both fun and fresh connections.

The Generosity Committee helped turn our Sunday offerings into action—channeling nearly \$78,000 to nonprofits advancing justice, education, and equity.
